The Gentiles Cry Out for Jesus

To grasp the inner motive of the Canaanite woman for obtaining what came to pass, we must reflect on the impact of her words. There is a firm belief that there was and still is in Israel a community of converts who passed over from the Gentiles into the works of the law. They had left behind their previous life and were bonded by the religion of a foreign land and dominating law as though from home. The Canaanites were inhabiting the lands of present-day Judea. Whether absorbed by war or dispersed to neighboring places or brought into servitude as a vanquished people, they carried about their name but lacked a native land. Intermingled with the Jews, therefore, these people came from the Gentiles. And since a portion of those among the crowds who believed were converts, the Canaanite woman most likely had left her territory, preferring the status of a proselyte - that is, coming out from the Gentiles to the community of a neighboring people. She was appealing on behalf of her daughter, who was a type for all the Gentile people. And since she knew the Lord from the law, she addressed him as Son of David. For in the law, the king of the eternal and heavenly kingdom is referred to as the "rod out of the stem of Jesse and the son of David." This woman, who professed Christ as both Lord and Son of David, did not need healing. Rather, she was begging for help for her daughter - that is, the Gentile people in the grips of unclean spirits.

God With Us Catechism

The blind man in today's Gospel offers us a powerful example of "holy boldness." He did not hesitate to cry out loudly to the Lord for mercy, despite being told by others to be quiet. His faith in Christ, and his awareness of his need for mercy would not allow him to be quiet. He knew that Christ had the authority to heal him, and believed that He would want him to be healed of his blindness, He did not let how he was perceived in the eyes of men to prevent Him from turning to the Lord and asking for his mercy. The world wants us to think that our faith is best kept quiet, that is what is "respectable." We can believe what we want, as long as we "keep it to ourselves." We must not keep our faith to ourselves, however! Our faith in Christ is the greatest gift we have and we must not be afraid to share it with others. Let us not be ashamed to proclaim ourselves Christians, and to proclaim the gift of mercy that God has given us. Notice in the Gospel that the very people that had told the blind man to be quiet, however, were moved after the Lord healed him, and they also praised God. When are willing to praise God publicly, we often remind others of the importance of thanking God, and embolden them to do so with us.
