This is why he restored the little girl of twelve years to life. He who was able to put the continued vitality of twelve years in the body back into its place was also able to arrest and banish from its place a flow of blood that continued for twelve years. He who was able to alleviate one illness was also able to banish another. He who was able to vivify all the dead members of this little girl was also able to heal the woman's womb.

WE ARE OFFICIALLY OBLIGED TO RETURN BACK TO CHURCH BEGINNING NOVEMBER 15

The General Dispensation issued during the Pandemic will end on November 15 (The first day of St. Philip’s Fast-Pylypivka 2022). Starting Sunday November 20, 2022, ALL Ukrainian Catholics of the Archeparchy of Philadelphia are obligated to attend Divine Services in Church on All Sundays and All Holy Days of Obligation. The only exceptions are for those:

1. who are sick or have a vulnerable health condition
2. who are a caregiver for someone sick or who has a vulnerable health condition
3. who are confined to their home or care facility
4. who have a serious reason to be excused or dispensed

God With Us Catechism

In the Gospel today we are reminded (and warned) that the way we live in this life will have everything to do with how we live in the next. While some may use this Gospel to condemn money or riches in general, this is a misuse of the text. The Gospel reminds us that it is not the “good things” which are evil but what we do with what we have that matters. While the “rich man” was blessed to have many good things, he refused to share these blessings with those around him. In the end it is Lazarus who is remembered by name and whose virtue is proclaimed in the Church today while the “rich man” remains nameless. He who made a name for himself on this earth is forgotten by the very ones he wanted to impress while the one who was counted lower than the dogs on this earth is elevated today by public proclamation in every church throughout the world.

Tobit 4:7 “Do not turn your face away from any poor man, and the face of God will not be turned away from you.”
